<p>1. Purpose</p> <p>2. Definitions SC 1303.1-A</p>	<p style="text-align: center;">249. BULLYING/CYBERBULLYING</p> <p>The Operating Committee is committed to providing a safe, positive learning environment for center students. The Operating Committee recognizes that bullying creates an atmosphere of fear and intimidation, detracts from the safe environment necessary for student learning, and may lead to more serious violence. Therefore, the Joint Operating Committee prohibits bullying by center students.</p> <p>Bullying means an intentional electronic, written, verbal or physical act or series of acts directed at another student or students, which occurs in a school setting that is severe, persistent or pervasive and has the effect of doing any of the following:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>1. Substantial interference with a student’s education.</li> <li>2. Creation of a threatening environment.</li> <li>3. Substantial disruption of the orderly operation of the center.</li> </ol> <p>Bullying is occurring when there exists an imbalance of physical, psychological, or social power between the aggressor and the victim, favoring the aggressor. Bullying is most often a series of aggressive acts including, but not limited to the following examples:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>1. Physically harming a student.</li> <li>2. Damaging, extorting, or taking a student’s personal or academic property.</li> <li>3. Placing a student in reasonable fear of physical harm.</li> <li>4. Placing a student in reasonable fear of damage to or loss of personal property.</li> <li>5. Systematically and intentionally excluding a student from activities with peers.</li> <li>6. Spreading false information about a student or attempting to influence others to exclude a student from an activity.</li> </ol>
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	<p>Bullying, as defined in this policy, includes cyberbullying. Cyberbullying includes, but is not limited to, the following misuses of technology: harassing, teasing, intimidating, threatening, or terrorizing another student, teacher or employee of the center by sending or posting inappropriate or derogatory email messages, instant messages, text messages, digital pictures or images, or website postings (including blogs).</p>
<p>SC 1303.1-A</p>	<p>School setting means in the school, on school grounds, in school vehicles, at a designated bus stop or at any activity sponsored, supervised or sanctioned by the school.</p>
<p>3. Authority SC 1303.1-A</p>	<p>The Operating Committee prohibits all forms of bullying by center students.</p> <p>The center expects students and parents/guardians who become aware of any act of bullying to immediately report that conduct. Students may report acts of bullying to their teachers, building administrators, or other school employees supervising school-sponsored activities. Students should be encouraged not to stand by as third parties and tolerate bullying by others. Parents/Guardians may contact the building administrator to report acts of bullying.</p> <p>The Operating Committee directs that complaints of bullying shall be investigated promptly, and corrective action shall be taken when allegations are verified. Confidentiality of all parties shall be maintained, consistent with the district's legal and investigative obligations. No reprisals or retaliation shall occur as a result of good faith reports of bullying.</p>
<p>4. Delegation of Responsibility</p>	<p>Each student shall be responsible to respect the rights of others and to ensure an atmosphere free from bullying.</p>
	<p>The Administrative Director or designee shall develop administrative regulations to implement this policy.</p>
<p>SC 1303.1-A</p>	<p>The Administrative Director or designee shall ensure that this policy and administrative regulations are reviewed annually with students.</p>
<p>SC 1303.1-A</p>	<p>The Administrative Director or designee, in cooperation with other appropriate administrators, shall review this policy every three (3) years and recommend necessary revisions to the Joint Operating Committee.</p>
<p>SC 1303.1-A</p>	<p>Center administration shall annually provide the following information with the Safe School Report:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>1. Joint Operating Committee's Bullying Policy.</li> <li>2. Report of bullying incidents.</li> </ol>



<p>SC 1303.1-A Pol. 218, 233</p>	<p>parents/guardians or employees; a review of student records and other reasonable efforts to better understand the facts surrounding a reported incident.</p> <p><u>Consequences For Violations</u></p> <p>A student who violates this policy shall be subject to appropriate disciplinary action consistent with the Code of Student Conduct, which may include: counseling, parental conference, loss of privileges, exclusion from center-sponsored activities, detention, suspension, referral for expulsion, and/or referral to law enforcement officials.</p> <p>Depending upon the severity of a particular situation, the building administrator may also take appropriate steps to ensure student safety. Such steps may include the implementation of a safety plan; separating and supervising the students involved; providing employee support for students as needed; reporting incidents to law enforcement, if appropriate; and developing a supervision plan with parents/guardians.</p> <p><u>Confidentiality</u></p> <p>The center recognizes that both the complaining student and the alleged bully/extorter have strong interest in maintaining the confidentiality of the allegations and related information. The privacy of the complaining student, the individual(s) against whom the complaint is filed, and the witness will be respected as much as possible, consistent with legal obligations to investigate, to take appropriate action, and to comply with Family Educational Rights Privacy Act (FERPA) and any discovery or disclosure obligations. As limited by FERPA protections, the administration may inform the complaining student/parents/guardians of the outcome of the investigation.</p>
<p>Pol. 218</p>	<p><u>Reprisal</u></p> <p>Any student who retaliates against another student for reporting bullying or extortion or for assisting or testifying in the investigation or hearing may be subject to disciplinary action.</p> <p>References:</p> <p>School Code – 24 P.S.
